

70 Years of Brotherhood and Excellence

Alpha Iota celebrated its platinum anniversary in 2007, and what a year it was! Seventy years of brotherhood, professionalism, and service to our community have made Alpha Iota one of the strongest chapters in the country. Founded on May 29th, 1937, Alpha Iota is proud to be the oldest pharmacy fraternity, and the only co-educational fraternity at the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy. The chapter is currently comprised of 55 brothers who through their dedication and hard work achieved 9th place in the coveted Thurston Cup Competition at the 66th Grand Council in West Palm Beach, Florida. Alpha Iota also received 3rd place for our professional and service projects, which is one of the most exciting accomplishments in our chapter's history. Since Grand Council, Alpha Iota has been working hard to further our accomplishments as a fraternity and to build a stronger sense of brotherhood within our chapter. This year has truly been a platinum year for Alpha Iota!

This year saw a continuance of the outstanding professional and service projects that you have come to expect from Alpha Iota. One of the most exciting new projects was the creation of a radio show on WUOG 90.5 FM. Airing Wednesdays at 4:30pm, Radio Rx is a 30 minute talk show addressing a different health topic each week. Radio Rx won "Best New Talk Show" and "Best Overall Talk Show" at WUOG for Spring 2008 and we are excited to continue to build the show into a huge success. Other professional projects included our window display discussing "behind the counter drugs," Pre-Pharmacy Society workshops, an MTM session at Iris Place, and Dawgtoberfest, the College of Pharmacy's annual health fair.

Our service projects have been some of our most successful events this year. Our fourth annual 5K Fun Run/Walk for St. Jude's Children's Hospital raised \$1000 dollars and our Relay for Life team raised over \$4000 dollars for cancer research. In addition to raising money, AI helped out at the AIDS Athens food bank, played bingo with seniors at the Morningside assisted-living home, collected Toys-for-Tots, and goods for the Battered Women's Shelter of Athens.

In addition to advancing the profession of pharmacy, Phi Delta Chi makes time for social gatherings as well. Everyone knows that the party doesn't start until Alpha Iota gets there! In November we celebrated the founding of our fraternity with dinner at Johnny Carino's in Athens with our families and alumni. We also held our twelfth annual MeatFest held at Mike, Reah, and Tracy's house which was a carnivore's dream. Some of our other social events included: Georgia Football tailgating, where you can always find AI in front of the pharmacy school, a Halloween costume party, a Cinco de Mayo party, movie and poker nights, and road trips to national events and other chapters' events such as the annual ski trip in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Our annual Spring Formal Banquet saw record attendance with almost 80 brothers, alumni, faculty, friends and family celebrating the year in beautiful downtown Athens at the Classic Center. Although the individual scholastic performance of our Brothers comes before all, it is very nice to enjoy each other's company away from our studies and build the bonds of brotherhood together.

In November we initiated seventeen wonderful new brothers and the contributions they have already made to Alpha Iota have been unbelievable. We are so proud of our new brothers and they have already become great ambassadors of Phi Delta Chi to our community and to the profession of pharmacy.

The motto of our fraternity is, *Alterum Alterius Auxilio Eget*, meaning "Each needs the help of the other." None of our accomplishments as a group could have been made possible without each of us remaining loyal to this motto. Our chapter would like to thank all of our faculty brothers, advisors, and especially all of our alumni who have given us so much support over the past year. Without you, we would not be the successful organization that we are today. Alpha Iota is planning big things for the future and we hope that your continued support will drive us to new heights in the future!


An Ultimate Cookout

What Brotherhood Means to Me

Brotherhood: Beyond the Dictionary and Stereotypes

At the beginning of the pledge period, I remember being told to start thinking about the following question: "What does brotherhood mean to you?" But at that point, I didn't really have an answer. In truth, the only thing that came to mind was, "I have to write something?" Throughout high school and my two undergraduate years in college, I was vehemently opposed to the idea of fraternities and sororities. I wasn't a social outcast, but my friends and I weren't the "pretty people" either. We didn't see a need to drop to the Greeks' level of under-age drinking and inappropriate behavior which was what I thought Greek life was all about. Obviously, this is a stereotype (though not untrue for many social fraternities). I never associated fraternities with anything deeper or more meaningful than a keg party.

So why did I look into Phi Delta Chi? I remembered some of the brothers coming to a meeting of the pre-pharmacy society at our school. Having now almost completed the pledge process, I see that it is more than just fulfilling requirements and service projects and learning about the history of the fraternity. We had a lot of fun at the Food Bank and learned to work together as a team to achieve goals. Our campus radio show on HIV/AIDS taught us to delegate responsibility and rely on one another to do a good job. The Halloween party we hosted was just a blast. Throughout the past semester, we have learned to work together, to depend on another, and to have fun as a group. 










Not only did we educate about this new class of drugs, we were also able to encourage people to talk to their pharmacist about these and all other drugs. 
Meet the New Brothers
