

News from the Dean of Student Affairs: Dr. Alan Wolfgang



This year has kept Dr. Wolfgang and the Student Affairs staff hopping with an even more competitive admissions season, in addition to business as usual. Beginning in Fall 2012, prospective students were able to submit their applications through the Pharm-CAS system, resulting in a 16% increase in the applicant pool. Dr. Wolfgang predicts over the course of the next few years admission will become even more competitive as more out-of-state students are tuned in to our college and what we have to offer. Efforts to continue improving the pharmacy program are underway, including bulking up the prerequisites beginning for admission in 2015; it is the hope that the burden of second year can be spread more evenly across both first and second years by shifting biochemistry and other fundamental classes to pre-pharmacy coursework to allow pharmacology or other drug-related material to be presented earlier in the program. On a personal note, congratulations to Dr. Wolfgang and his wife, Carla, who will be celebrating their 35th anniversary this year!


Letter From the WCC



Alpha Iota celebrates another exciting year full of accomplishments, service to our community, growth in leadership, and new memories forged in Brotherhood! The year began with planning for fall rush and sending 12 eager Brothers to Lexington, KY for the biannual Leader-Development Seminar. We were extremely proud to be the Chapter with the most representation at LDS, and could not be more grateful to our highly generous alumni and faculty Brothers for making that possible. With exceptional guidance from our facilitators, we learned how to better serve our Chapter as leaders while bonding with Brothers from across the nation. I was humbled by our 6th place

ranking for the Thurston Cup, as well as top 10 placement in Brotherhood and Professional/Service projects.

Upon our return to Athens, GA from LDS, officers quickly planned a full agenda for our annual Summer Retreat at Tugaloo State Park. As always, Brothers were excited to catch up with each other after a long summer. This retreat focused on leadership and continuous improvement. In preparation for the upcoming year, AI Brothers had an equal voice while engaging in a reflective Diamonds and Stones activity to highlight the areas of success and improvement for our Chapter, and gained a new perspective on prioritization and delegation during a fun juggling exercise on the beach - an enlightening activity from one of the many LDS workshops. We also decided to hold our Chapter bimonthly and combine our service and professional committees into one. To streamline Throughout the year, AI held true to our mission of advancing the science of pharmacy and its allied interests. One of our biggest accomplishments was reaching out to the children in our local community through the Boys & Girls Club of Athens. This year, not only did we have fun with the kids during a Halloween party and Easter egg hunt, but we also incorporated a new health component by teaching them about healthy habits surrounding hydration and nutrition using the My Plate method. It was certainly a challenge keeping the children's attention, but a rewarding experience nonetheless! We also hosted two guest speakers for the college's weekly organizational hour: a veterinary medicine doctor /pharmacist who runs a pet vet clinic, and a CV expert from our career center. To help our faculty advisor Dr. Perri, several of us played the patient role for the P1 class's counseling final exam. Under fresh leadership of first-year Brothers Lillian and Carolyn, the Chapter came together to design and present our annual window display entitled "Women's Health: What You Need to Know Down Below" that focused on dispelling myths and educating the public on types of birth control, STDs, and vaccinations. We continued to represent the Fraternity and UGA College of Pharmacy at the Dawgtoberfest and Multicultural Health Fairs with a revamped display on our favorite topic "Let's Talk About Sex".



This year, our satellite Brothers in Augusta were more involved with community outreach and the Chapter's activities in general, and created a display "Get the Shot, Not the Flu" which was presented to employees at the local teaching hospital.

AI is also dedicated to serving our community in other ways. Through our annual fall 5K, we raised close to \$900 in support our national philanthropy, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. This year's 5K had an adventurous new twist, an epic quest with a King Arthur theme, an idea spurred by Brother Rebecca. Support for St. Jude continued in the spring with an electronics and recyclables collection. For a second year, Brothers hosted a reception called "Tea at Two" for patients, families, and staff at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. We continued volunteering efforts to help the hungry at the Northeast GA Food Bank and to keep Athens beautiful through the Adopt-A-Highway program. These early Saturday morning cleanups were never complete without a comparison of unusual items found on Timothy Road, and a Brotherly breakfast to follow our hard work.

Finally, this academic year ended with a special Graduation Ceremony, held separately from the spring formal as in past years, on the night before graduation. In the presence of family and friends, this gathering was undoubtedly touching as it was our last time to rejoice as collegiate Brothers and wish our soon-to-be alumni Brothers well on their journeys ahead. Graduating Brothers were honored with PDC cords, a red carnation, and two beautifully crafted tiered cakes courtesy of the talents of Brothers Charles and Jessica. We are eternally thankful for the contributions, encouragement, and guidance of our 19 graduating Brothers over the last four years.

And so a new year begins, one to be filled with even greater accomplishments, stronger ties, new memories, and a renewed sense of serving others. 

Officer Reports





Outgoing WKF — Katherine Kwon



Incoming WAL — Rebecca Howell









Dr. Randall Tackett is a highly respected Faculty Brother of Alpha Iota and a professor of the Department of Clinical and Administrative Pharmacy at UGA. He specializes in pharmacology and toxicology. Outside of the classroom, he educates fellow healthcare professionals about the safety of prescription medication through continuing education programs. He also works with attorneys and judges to provide expertise on various legal issues at a local level, but he has also participated in cases that have received national attention. Dr. Tackett has also been recognized in some law textbooks as a result of his work and input regarding the Daubert Standard*

in the legal system. Most recently, along with a fellow professor, he petitioned the Food and Drug Administration to make changes to increase the safety of over-the-counter medications, specifically ibuprofen. In addition, he finds time to be involved in community service and philanthropy, specifically through the Free to Breathe program, part of the National Lung Cancer Awareness Partnership. In the future Dr. Tackett hopes to continue to increase awareness about substance abuse and to raise awareness among healthcare providers about the safety of prescription drugs.







Dr. Beach's Peach Chipotle Wings

Ingredients:

- •Olive oil (To coat)
- •Mrs. Dash Chicken Grilling Blend
- •1 tsp. salt
- •Black pepper (To taste)
- 2.5 lb. of chicken wings
- •2 cups of All Fruit peach preserves
- 3 tablespoons of Kikkoman's light soy sauce
- •1/2 bottle of Tabasco brand Chipotle sauce

Directions:

- 1. Clean and coat wings with olive oil. Preheat the oven to 360°. Toss the wings with Mrs. Dash seasoning, salt and black pepper. Spread the wings in a deep oven dish.
- 2. Place the dish in the oven and bake the wings for 30 minutes. Remove dish from oven and shake to prevent wings from sticking.
- 3. Mix the peach preserves and soy sauce in a bowl and microwave for 30 seconds. Add in the Tabasco Chipotle sauce. Blend the mixture until smooth.
- 4. Transfer the chicken into a bowl and pour enough sauce to coat the wings.
- $5. \ Place the wings back into the oven and bake for <math display="inline">15 \ minutes.$
- 6. Take the wings back out, repeat coating of sauce two more times.

Counseling Project


Dawgtoberfest

Window Display: Rx Walking

Though in years past our Chapter's window display project consisted of simply a poster board presented to community residents, this year we decided to undertake a different approach to spread health awareness. In the fall semester, it was decided by the former Professional/ Service chairmen to present the topic of women's health. We created a video presentation called "Rx Walking". Rx Walking was executed by the spring semester Professional/ Service Committee chairmen, Carolyn Le and Lillian Otieno, and it's a play on the popular Jaywalking segments featured on The Tonight Show with Jay Leno.



We filmed our segments in a variety of places, and with each person we interviewed we learned more about people's awareness of women's health issues and educated them on information they were lacking. While discussing issues pertaining to sex, we had some pretty interesting responses from our participants.

During our Rx Walking event at the Beechwood theater, Brother Aimee Shin asked one person what she should do if a condom broke during sex. Our contributor, while holding her coffee, thought about the question and finally stated, "Well, I would be like, just make sure you pull out". Though this thought process was flawed, Aimee persevered through any awkwardness and educated her on the proper ways to deal with this unfortunate circumstance.



Another similarly uncomfortable situation occurred while filming Rx Walking at the Carmike theater. In this instance, Brother Ji Young interviewed an older married couple, and she asked the question, "Can you get pregnant through anal sex?" Surprisingly, the wife simply laughed off the question and replied in the negative. Her husband simply gave Ji a look and retreated into the background.

In addition, we were pleasantly surprised that other participants in our informal survey were more proactive and knowledgeable when it came to women's

health. People knew to get annual checkups with their primary care physician. Many women were knowledgeable about the HPV vaccine and many of the mothers we interviewed stated that they had their daughters vaccinated. However, we were still able to provide education about a variety of



important topics, including contraception. We had the chance to gauge people's knowledge about women's health, in a real world setting, and experiment with a daring project. Most importantly, we were able to use our knowledge as future pharmacists to educate the public on one of the most controversial ongoing topics in healthcare. Because of this, in a small way, we were able to raise awareness of women's health in our community.



Service Projects

St. Jude 5K








Secret Cupid
