books. We started the 2014-2015 school year with eight Brothers attending the Leadership Development Seminar in Tampa, Florida. LDS gave the Brothers the opportunity to forge new connections with collegiates from other Chapters, but it also gave us the opportunity to rekindle bonds with Alumni. The Brothers got to spend some quality time with Alpha Iota alumna Lexie Turner and we deeply appreciate all her wonderful advice — it has definitely helped our Chapter reach new heights!

This year Alpha Iota had the privilege of working with the Phi Delta Chi National Office as well as with Brothers from the Southeast Region. We received a National Office Chapter visit from our Southeast Regional Director for Collegiate Affairs and Gamma Zeta Alumnus, Kyle Wheatley, and Texas Chapter Alumni Treasurer and Alpha Omega Alumnus, Sara Miller. Brother Kyle started the visit with a discussion on what Alpha Iota Brothers believed to be the strengths and weakness of our Chapter. He and Brother Sara Miller answered questions that we had and gave us advice on how to improve and our Chapter overall. Perhaps our biggest accomplishment this year was our opportunity to host the Southeast Regional Olympics. Brothers from Chapters throughout the PDC Southeast Region came over to lend their support and participate in the field day. The day's events included

relay races, teambuilding exercises, tug-of-war, a barbeque cookout, the tour of Athens, and a banquet and award ceremony to conclude the day's festivities.

Brother Eric Trinh graciously hosted Summer Retreat at his family's Lake Lanier lake house. Winter Retreat was held at the usual Stoney River and Edgewater Lodges in Ellijay, GA. With the help of WVC Joe Angelini and WKRS Kasandra Hour, we were able to keep the Brotherhood well-fed and provide endless hours of entertainment and brotherhood activities while guessing whose Brother's baby picture it was in our annual game of Jeopardy.

Rush! Rush! Rush! Alpha Iota despite turning 78 years old still continues to grow. This year our Chapter welcomed 26 new Brothers into our fold - totaling our active Brother count to 85. I am very excited and very proud that Phi Delta Chi is being represented well throughout the College of Pharmacy by many Brothers who have received scholarships and prestigious awards. Alpha Iota continues to take pride in our long tradition of leadership within the College of Pharmacy due to our Brothers' extensive involvement and acquired leadership positions in many other student organizations.

This year the Professional/Service Committee continued our participation in the College of Pharmacy's Dawgtoberfest, as well as our Tim-

othy Road Adopt-A-Highway and Northeast Georgia Food Bank service projects to help our local community. This year we initiated more professional projects such as the vitamin poster board presentation and a vaccine poster board presentation at the Talmadge Terrace - Lanier Gardens Retirement Community. The seniors enjoyed what we had to say - especially about the shingles vaccine! Another new event that happened this year was our first Alumni Networking Luncheon. We invited PDC Alumni from various pharmacy practices and matched them up with current Brothers who were interested in their field of work. Brothers and Alumni were able to learn more about each other over a delicious meal and allowed the opportunity for active Brothers to reconnect with Alumni Brothers. We hope to continue these projects and come up with different ideas to help advance the pharmacy profession. Professional/Service also did an outstanding job coordinating our annual St. Jude Children's 5K walk/race. Though the weather did not cooperate as much as we had hoped for we were able to register over 30 participates and raised over \$1,000 for St. Jude!

From organizing Carnivore Carnival (previously known as Meatfest), Homecoming Tailgate, Progressive Dinner, and the Holiday Party, Social Committee has been very busy! This year's Spring Formal theme, "007 Casino Royale" was held at Trump's Catering. Aside from enjoying delicious food and dancing beneath the star-domed dance floor, we recognized the accomplishments of our Brothers most notably our Faculty of the Year, Ashley Hannings, and Alumnus of the Year, Whitney Holcombe.

Let's not forget about our Fundraising and Scholarship Committees either. Fundraising hit the ground running with t-shirts sales including our new "Dawgxycycline" shirts, which became a fan-favorite. The Valentine's Day Bake Sale was a huge success as well. Due to the new professional dress code next year, Fundraising has also been working on a new College of Pharmacy polo shirt design that provides a dress alternative for pharmacy students. This year we amended our bylaws to add a co-chair position to the Scholarship Committee, thus taking the burden off of our

WVC who has previously in the past been the only Scholarship Chair. By doing so, they were able to implement new ideas and help Brothers with their scholastic progress. Some exciting new projects that Scholarship committee initiated were bathroom drug cards - to help pharmacy students study for their weekly drug card quizzes (wherever they may be), and pizza trivia nights after Chapter meetings to help Brothers review materials before their test that week.

In December of 2010, I graduated from the University of Georgia with a Biology major, a minor in Korean, and little to no direction for my career. I was not sure where to go with my life so I went back to my parents' house to figure out what I was going to do. After a year of staying at home, I realized that it was not the direction I wanted to go and started working as a technician at a Kroger pharmacy. After working for a year, I started looking into pharmacy school. My first interaction with a Brother of Phi Delta Chi started when I went to a UGA College of Pharmacy open house. I spoke to a collegiate Brother who was we were both non-traditional students who had been in limbo after receiving an undergraduate degree. Speaking to a Brother who shared a similar path with me motivated me to study arduously for the PCAT. I scored in the 88th percentile and close to a perfect score on the science sections. The encouragement that the Brother had given me was the first taste of what brotherhood and PDC stood for.

I matriculated into UGA pharmacy school in the fall of 2014 and went to all three rush events that the Brothers had set up. I took a lot of time and effort to try and get to know each Brother and rushee as well as I could. I was able to get a bid and eventually became a Brother. Throughout the year, I interacted with my pledge class and older Brothers. This would culminate in a trip to the 2014 Leadership Development Seminar in Tampa, Florida where I had the most interesting experience as a Brother up to that time.

At LDS, I couldn't help but be shocked at the level of passion Brothers from other chapters had for PDC. One Brother, who had come all the way from California, started crying at how divided her chapter was over issues, such as pledging and different cliques within the chapter fighting with each other. While I thought the passion was peculiar, I couldn't help but wonder what motivated a Brother to become so emotional over their chapter.

As my second year started I saw a rift within our own chapter. The second year class had taken most of the executive positions within our chapter. Since the less experienced Brothers were being put into positions of power, they did not understand the traditions and logistics of the fraternity as well as the third year class. There was a massive amount of miscommunication and the chapter as a whole suffered from it. One of the consequences was an alumni speaking boldly about our lack of involvement and communication

with the alumni. This concerned me, and I decided the best place to get help with complications within the chapter was to speak to the Brothers who had come before us. I spoke to my faculty advisors and a national officer from my chapter to figure out what the best direction to take for the fraternity was. Building a bridge with the alumni became a passion of mine and, in 2015, I ran for and won the position of Worthy Alumni Liaison. I spoke to the alumni who spoke boldly to us at the PDC event, and I realized that a lack of communication was the biggest problem within our chapter. In order to have a stronger chapter we needed to consistently communicate and work together for the common goal of fostering brotherhood and maintaining tradition. One of the ideas that I had as WAL was to send out videos to the alumni chapter in order to get them to know the Brothers of the collegiate chapter. I consistently spoke to the collegiate Brothers explaining my vision for the videos. Since I was able to communicate clearly to them, the videos were produced efficiently, and the alumni thoroughly enjoyed seeing the faces of the collegiate chapter.

The Brothers of my chapter are what keep me motivated to stay as an actively involved Brother of PDC. The brotherhood that they cultivate keeps me out of my comfort zone and helps me actively solve any issues that may arise. The passion that they have for PDC encourages me to push myself as an individual and make the chapter consistently stronger for the future.




Outgoing WCC: Jeff Cheung


Outgoing WAL: Nathan Wayne












Bowling at Showtime Bowl By Sean Hawkins




Cookout at Memorial Park By Trinh Tran







PADDLE EXCHANGE




UGA history, Phi Delta Chi history, and Know-A-Bro (Baby Pictures!).

In this presentation, we also showed the elderly community how to read labels and what parts they should pay attention to such as the active ingredient, dosage and side effects.

We were able to get 75% participation from Brothers and also get one of our faculty advisors, Dr. Ashley Hannings, involved with the presentation. This ensured we had a pharmacist available on the day of the presentation to supervise and answer any clinical questions. This presentation was a great success overall since both the Brothers and the residents enjoyed it greatly as both parties involved were able to learn something new and Brothers were able to apply their clinical skills. We look forward to continuing such presentations and expanding to different communities in Athens. This is an excellent way of promoting the profession of pharmacy, which really justifies our mission: to advance the science of pharmacy and its allied interests and to foster and promote a fraternal spirit among Brothers.



VACCINATIONS




FUNDRAISING

Jessica Chen



Jennifer Lee



Chris Stiles


The Baron O'Styles became a pharmacist for Walgreens in Augusta. He enjoys life after pharmacy school and wants to find time to get back into video games.

Erin: "Yeah I was super slow and cautious at first. I'm faster now, but still cautious. Triple check the drug, strength, etc. on C2s (especially hydrocodone if they are still keeping it on the shelf like at my store, and the technicians still count it). If they ever make tramadol a C2, I'm finding a new profession." In response to Alex conveying fears about his quality dropping with speed: "Yeah you just have to do the best you can and remind yourself to slow down even if they're staring you down/yelling at you about waiting (which they will totally do), because sometimes it could be a potentially fatal misfill. Thankfully that hasn't happened to me yet though my technicians seem bound and determined to screw up."

"Oh one more tip: learn the maximum doses for common antibiotics for kids! I have a tiny notebook with all the maximum doses and kids' weights in kg from age 0 to 12 years... So many babies and amoxicillin."




Joanne Yi

What I don't like:

"Dealing with numerous drug shortages and yet having heavily restricted formulary sometimes makes clinical decisions fairly challenging regarding optimal drug therapy. However, I am fortunate to also be working for University Hospital, which is a non-profit community hospital with a completely different environment in terms of restrictions. Also I am limited to serving adults/geriatric patient population at the VA. However, with my position at the University, I enjoy the opportunity to expand my practice to neonatal, women and adult patients in a setting of less restricted formulary.

Advice to 1-2nd years and rising 4th years:

"Keep your mind open! Get involved in professional organizations. Explore your options by completing challenging rotations not only in areas that you may like but also other areas that you may not be so familiar with. Optimal performance in unfamiliar areas will cultivate adaptability and allow you to get out of your comfort zone, because you never know what opportunity may present itself. Plans are great to make, but if things don't necessarily go as planned, then you will still have your versatile experiences to fall back on!"

Advice to 4th years soon to be graduating:

"Congratulations!! You're finally seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. Whether going into community practice, residency/industry fellowship or directly into hospital pharmacy, remember all those late nights you stayed up studying and all those days after those tests that you spent either celebrating, sleeping, or studying for the next test. In a nutshell, you have worked too hard to get where you are today, so continue to stay motivated in your practice and continue to learn and apply the stellar education you have received as a pharm-dawg to be an exemplary pharmacist!"

I would not have my job at Northeast GA if the newly promoted manager didn't recognize my name.
