

the smiles that we bring by just spending a couple hours with the seniors of Athens.





ARIELLE CHARLES


I'm excited to bring our brotherhood and reach our professional potential. Our chapter is in for a great year of growing.

MEGAN MOORE







LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR












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IS THE AVERAGE GPA FOR THE P1-P3 CLASS

Despite all of the academic benefits a study party has, it also provides another significant benefit. It gives us an excuse to hang out with each other- and that's always a plus in my book.






9. ST JUDE 5K





key rendition of Happy Birthday for Brothers Emily, Maegan and Alex.


